Distance Learning

Innovative distance education Master's degree program uses an online course management system and web-based conferencing.



Afternoon and Evening Classes

The Program offers all classes in the late afternoon or evening in order to accommodate part-time and working students.



Student to Teacher Ratio

A ten (10) to one (1) student to teacher ratio exists in our program. Students attend small classes and have frequent interaction with faculty.

Multicultural Emphasis

One of the program's main goals is to increase students' levels of multicultural awareness, knowledge and skills, especially as applied to rehabilitation counseling practice.

Application Requirements

Applications will be considered for both the spring and fall semesters. Admissions are based on previous preparation and background, intellectual and affective potential for graduate study, and personal qualifications that contribute to success as a rehabilitation counselor. Applications presume satisfactory completion of a bachelor's degree with an acceptable undergraduate grade-point average. Applicants must submit a completed graduate admissions application, the application fee and one official transcript from each post-secondary institution attended to the Graduate Division.

Departmental requirements are in addition to those of the Graduate Division and should show evidence that an applicant's personal qualifications, motivation, and academic preparation indicate competencies and potential success in rehabilitation counseling. Three letters of recommendation relating to the candidate's personal qualifications and/or professional background, resume and a statement of objectives are to be submitted directly to the Department of Kinesiology and Rehabilitation Science. An interview and writing sample are also required.

Scholarships

Scholarships may be available to qualified, successful applicants through the U.S. Department of Education, Rehabilitation Services Administration and the College of Education.
